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
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Editor's Bit

R Till spoke at length on the changes to the constitution to comply with the present day rules of the incorporation,

Motion .

The members request the committee to amend the constitution of the club to comply with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 and to present the amended constitution to members for approval at the next annual general meeting.

The amended constitution is to include the following changes to the membership requirements

- Remove the Pensioner classification for new members whilst retaining the classification for existing pensioner members.
- Change the classification from Provisional members to Probationary members
- 3. Require applications for Full or Associate membership to have been Probationary members for a minimum of 11 months.
- 4. Probationary members with less than 11 months club membership may renew their membership only once.

This month has been busy once again around the club. The irrigation pump that waters our run ways had seized up for some unknown reason, so it was removed and taken away for repairs, it was reinstalled on Saturday and run for 4 hours to make sure there wern't any leaks, after 4 hours a inspection was

carried out to see if any leaks had occurred and a leak was discovered between the pump flange and the pump body, the motor was separated once again, a new "O-ring will be sourced during the week and reinstalled on the following week end and tested once again.

A 2nd drive way has been installed, to provide better access to the right hand car park which has been for many years a rough and difficult car park to get too. The crushed rock brought in to repair the second drive way cost the club \$720.00; labour to install the drive way was free once again. The Kubota tractor with the 4 in 1 bucket attachment is saving the club quite a few hundred dollars on doing little jobs around the club as we do not need to bring in contractors to do the work.

Many thanks to the lads who replaced the rotted out barge board and pole and fitted the flashing to the club house and also fitting the sheet metal flashing to the tractor shed to keep out the birds out of the tractor shed.

Our new web master Paul Webber is doing a great job since taking over when Daniel Jenkins left our great club, Paul has learned a great deal about our web cam and security system and we now have a possibility to expand on the web cams as well as the security system. This only can be done when funds are available.

The water cart with the Ute tray mounted on top of it is working out great as a work platform as it is far safer to work from than using ladders. The platform was recently used by the lads when installing the barge board. This water cart/work platform is only to be used by qualified persons and must be attached to a tow vehicle when in use. The water cart/platform is still under construction and will reworked/modified to suit our needs. A ladder will be mounted on the trailer as well as a better jockey wheel arrangement.

The committee has been considering placing plaques with a photo of the members and a summary of their time and contribution to the club, on the club house walls.

At this stage this is a consideration so comments and ideas are still very welcome. But we would like to make a decision soon so don't dilly dally with your ideas.

Notice of Motion

This motion will complete the original discussion regarding replacemt of mowing equipment for the runways and pitts.

The Motion is:

That the club purchase a John Deere LA 115 19.5hp ride on mower complete with a Tilt Trailer with Polypropylene tray.

Proposed by Norm Morrish and supported by the committee. (Norm will present his motion at our next club meeting.

The negotiated purchase price is \$3500 for the mower and \$275 for the Tilt trailer. The proposed use of this mower is to mow the pit area, pilot standing areas car parks and, the sides of the driveway. These areas are difficult to mow without risking damage to the new runway mower. Also to tipper trailer will be ideal for carting topsoil around when filling depressions and cracks in the runways.

VMAA

Putting my P&DARCS VMAA representatives hat on its time again to update you on the thrills and spills of running Victorian aeromodeling. Well, actually VMAA business can be a tad boring at times like all administrative bodies business. So, I am limiting these reports to every few months. Some exciting news this month though but I will leave that till last.

1. A little while back the Northern flying group (NFG) applied for a grant to purchase a new tractor. As you are no doubt aware NFG are the caretaker club for the state field.

After much discussion a loan was offered by the VMAA to be paid back over 7 years. A good result I think Northern are only a small club and purchasing large items can be costly. As the State field needs to be ready for action at all times a Loan is a good solution.

2. Incident reports:

- a. A modeler was hit in the shoulder and hip by the rotors when his heli went into failsafe on start up.
- b. Model hit a car in car park
- c. Model veered offline on take off and struck a caller from another flightline in the leg

I have put these in here to remind you to take care at all times . Our sport can be very dangerous.

- 3. The MAAA is applying to the ASC (Australian Sports Council ,..... I think) to be recognized as A National Sports Organisation. Unfortunately, this application has been rejected. The MAAA are putting in an appeal and providing additional information to the ASC.
- 4. The VMAA budget was moved and accepted and the result will be a small increase of \$3 in the VMAA fee this year. The MAAA fees are still to be announced.
- 5. The VMAA will be putting on a static display at the Avalon Airshow next year. Dates are 1st to 6th March
- 6. The VMAA AGM will be held on the 15th July 2010.
- 7. And the best for last..... The VMAA have for quite a while been looking at trying to purchase the State flying field from the MAAA. This has now been approved and the VMAA will be purchasing it over a 15 year period for a price of \$270,000 I believe that the interest charged by the MAAA is around 50% of commercial loan rates. The good news and why this is a smart move is that the field is actually currently valued at \$550,000. Also in purchasing this field it will allow the VMAA to possibly get the MAAA to purchase a second field in the state as some stage. The more fields we own the better outlook for the future of aeromodelling.

Cessna Light Singles

It is perhaps testament to their success that we tend to take the Cessna range of light single engine aircraft for granted these days. Cessna have dominated this section of the market for over fifty years as each new generation of buyers has appreciated their proven design and performance, practicality and of course their classic appearance.

As we have seen with so many aircraft, their appearances have fundamentally altered over the years. In the case of Cessna this took place right across their range of light tricycle-undercarriage

singles in the mid to late nineteen fifties. This time it was not to remedy a center of gravity problem or other urgent necessity but simply for cosmetic purposes! In fact, the changes *reduced* the performance of the aircraft.

In the early fifties Cessna had settled on the all metal, high wing, tricycle undercarriage configuration and it was so successful that it is essentially unaltered over fifty years later. However at that time of swept wing jets, and even cars with huge raked fins, it was decided to




make the Cessna range look more modern by raking the fin and rudder and cutting down the rear fuselage to accommodate a rear window. The raked fin and rudder were of course less effective, although not as much as perhaps imagined, and the airflow around the rear window was obviously going to be a source of increased drag....and who was going to be looking out of that rear window anyway?

The result was a racier looking aircraft though and sales boomed. Even today some of these aircraft are still being produced and still look perfectly modern to most of us proving that the new look of the fifties was to become a timeless classic. Park a new Cessna 180 next to a line of 1958 cars and you will be quickly convinced that they got the aesthetics right all those years ago.







Letter to the Editor.

Dear David,

I wish to write to the newsletter to express my thoughts about the club. This is based upon quite a few years of keen membership and observations.

I feel that PDARC's is losing its direction and is suffering somewhat from a personality crisis. I remember the days when the club was about participation and friendly rivalry. There were a regular series of events that introduced members to the idea of competition. The Gary Meehan, The President's Trophy, the 100 lapper, The Monty and a scheduled fun fly event. Sadly these have fallen away and the Monty Tyrell does not reflect what its purpose once was. Apart from the friendly competition these events also encouraged team spirit and we had to work and play together to get them run on the day. There was no grumbling when the field was closed as club competitions are part of the fundamental things that make up a club.

I feel we are stale and it is reflected in the lack of enthusiasm to the VMAA trophy, the lack of comradeship at the field and the friction that has developed over the last few years. I am guilty of all of the above as I feel are a lot of members.

I think we have become complacent with what we have and we take it for granted. The talk I hear is what we don't have, not what we do have. 


