President's Report

Well one month in as Prez' and we have run a successful yet smaller than previous auction and the weather is brightening up to where we are starting to see members coming out of hibernation and committing aviation again.

Following my call for thoughts on club matters like club meetings and the future direction of the club I have a few responses, 5 in fact , Five members that showed enough interest to email me their thoughts. A big thank you to those guys. From this I can conclude that the majority of members are happy with the status quo or don't really care.

I will assume the answer is happy but open to new ideas. So what new ideas could there be?

Well as far as club meetings go we will try to get some guest speakers along from both modeling and none modeling fields. Frank D has already organized a couple and Daniel will be organizing the rest. Please roll up and show your interest. Don't forget that coming to meetings is also the way to get any ideas you have for the club across to the committee and the membership. It is also where you can support or voice your objections to projects the club proposes or volunteer your help.

Now the field

What should be our future direction here? Well for the last few years we have spent a bit on infrastructure so maybe our next phase should be the actual field itself. We already have been working to improve the field drainage. So what about the field flying areas?

Now I am thinking aloud here so this is not committee policy but we could look to raise the runways a little so they would drain quicker and therefore be more useable in wet weather or after a flood. We could also look at putting in a hard surface runway parallel to one of the existing runways. This will obviously not be cheap. Funds could be raised by increased fees, or by borrowing the money from the MAAA or VMAA and paying that back over a number of years. The latter option may only increase fees by \$20 -\$30 per year.

Another idea I have harbored for while is to put in a lake for float flying. If we did this the dirt, approx 2500 Meters worth could be used to raise the runways. Killing two projects with the one spend. I have had rough wild guestimates of the cost for this of \$20,000. A hard surface runway would cost probably something similar or probably more. Even if the total cost was say \$60,000 and this was borrowed from the MAAA over 15 or 20 years the cost per member if we maintain 150 of them each year may only be the previously mentioned \$20 to\$30 per year.

Another method of providing funding other than from membership fees would be to sell advertising around the field in the same way. Your local Footy club does. Maybe even selling ad space on our website. **So**, now that I have scared you into thinking that you have elected a crazy man let me remind you these are my thoughts of what I would love to see at the club. I do realize that a model club's greatest enemy though is the shallow pockets of its members in relation to fees they are willing to pay. They are always deep in relation to buying models though. :-)

10 years ago P&DARCS facilities were considered to be the best in the State and maybe in Australia. However, I personally think that we are in danger of being left behind and other clubs are catching up or have already caught us up.

When the club founders bought our current field they were considered radicals and it split the club a little and lost members. Yet in hindsight --- Wow what a smart move -Are we brave enough to take the next step?

Field Manager's Report

HELP NEEDED.

Good news at last. The strips and pits are dry. The mower men are cutting them weekly and we have rolled the strips 4 times in the last 3 weeks.

The runways are not as good as they were prior to the flood. We have many more low spots and bad undulations due to the floods causing severe ground movement. They may not be obvious to look at but we certainly feel them as we mow.

I have spoken to an excavating contractor who can supply many truck loads of sandy loam soil free of charge. This is great news because one truckload we bought last year cost \$600. We need approximately 20 truck loads and I am planning for early October. I will inspect the quality of first trial load before accepting the others.

We will be dumping the loads directly onto the bad spots on the strips and pits. The Front End Loader with Grader blade will spread the dirt **but we will need people with rakes to do the finer detail work.**

This work will cause some minor disruption to the flying while the trucks and loader are on the strips. The end result will be worth it.

We have filled most low spots in the two grassed car parks with the drain excavated material. These will be rolled soon and top filled with loads of the free dirt. Full marks to Paul Somerville for fitting car wheels to an old ride on mower trailer to make tipping easier. I have made a large steel trough for it and it now takes two full front end bucket loads. We have just tried it out and it self empties. <u>Great work Paul.</u>

CIVILIAN CLASSICS By Richard (Dick) Ryland

AUSTER

This aircraft was the quintessential British light aircraft for many, many years just as the Tiger moth had been before it. Indeed they shared the same engine set-up and that gave a similar look to the forward section of the aircraft. Due to a scarcity of Lycoming engines Auster installed the 130 hp Gipsy Major engine. Over 3,000 Austers were built and they were used throughout the British Commonwealth.

Imagine my surprise many years ago to learn that the Auster had its origins in the USA! Yes, this apparently so very, very British aircraft was, in its first version, a license built copy of the American Taylorcraft aircraft. These aircraft known as Taylorcraft Auster aircraft were built from 1938 and over 1500 were produced during WW11 as air observation aircraft. The name changed to simply Auster in 1946.



After the war many of these came onto the civilian market and Auster (a Roman word meaning the south wind) produced an extraordinary number of variations for civilian use. Specific models were made to carry 2, 3 or 4 passengers, agricultural work, training, glider towing and one model was even produced to be used in Antarctic exploration.

The aircraft was built around a fabric covered metal tube framework. It was quite simple to maintain and not difficult to fly. It did have a fairly low crosswind limit for landing and I have witnessed pilots having great difficulty taxiing the aircraft in the direction they wanted to go on blustery days.



In 1955 an Auster began a comedy or errors when it got away from its pilot who was trying to hand start it. It took off and flew around above Sydney for about three hours causing great concern to air traffic and about where it would eventually come down. A RAAF Wirraway was tasked with shooting it down over the sea but the gunner's hands became frozen to his gun in the intense cold. Two Meteor jets were to be scrambled but a Sabre jet blew a tire on landing blocking their runway. Eventually they got airborne but were frustrated by the slow speed of the pilot less Auster and jammed guns. The RAN sent two of their Sea Furies up from Nowra and the wayward Auster was finally dispatched safely into the sea. I swear it is all true! Look for "Flyaway Auster " on You Tube.
